- An information scavenger hunt

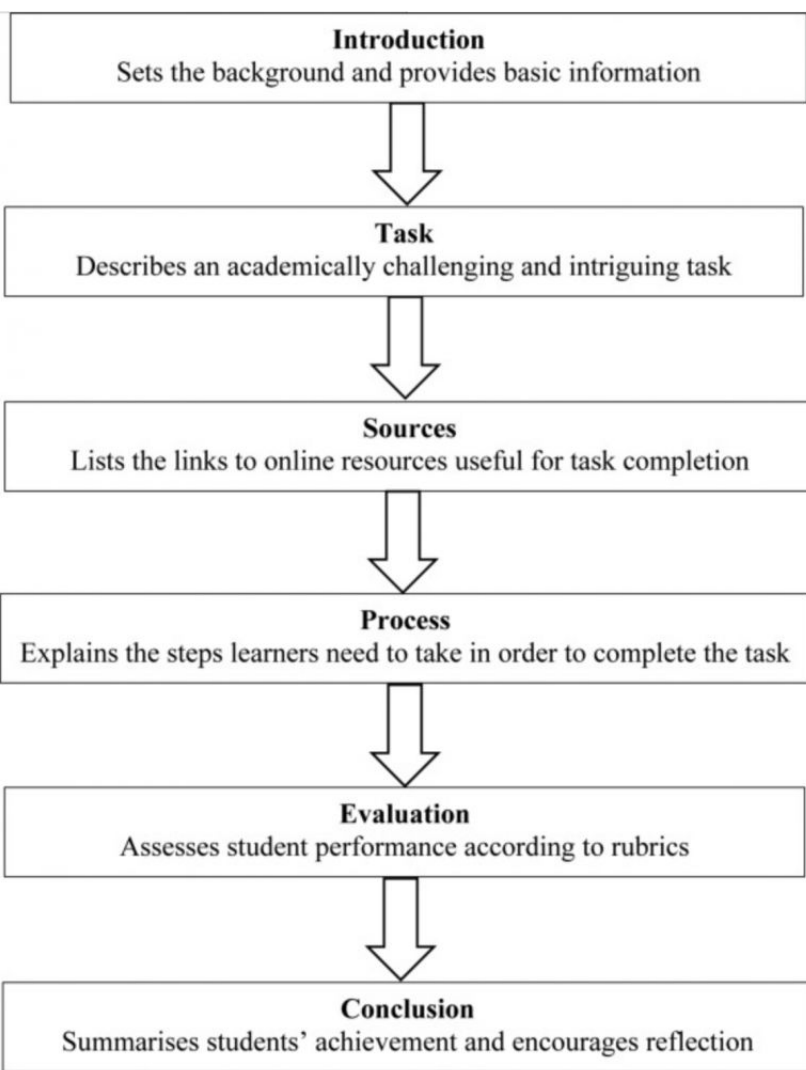

WebQuest example 1:

Introduction

Whether we like it or not, almost all teens today are online. In this WebQuest, you will explore the benefits and drawbacks of social media and screens. You will decide on a plan that works best for you to be safe and happy online.

WebQuest example 2:

Introduction

We eat plants every day. But what are we really eating? In this WebQuest, you will find out!

Tasks

1. Draw a diagram of the external parts of a plant.
2. Create a table with examples of edible external plant parts.
3. Plan a meal that includes a variety of edible plant parts.

WebQuest example 3:

Introduction

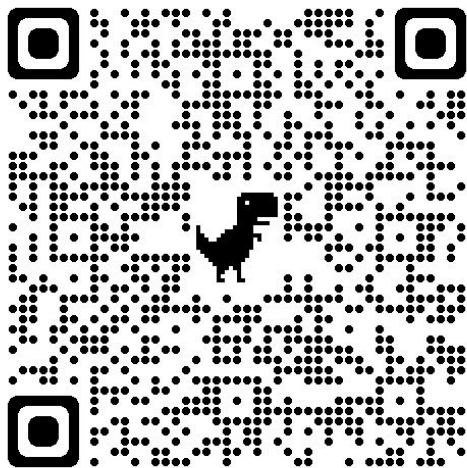
